A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this

WELCOME TO OLD SAINT MARY'S CATHEDRAL

WHERE IS OUR JOURNEY TAKING US? A Reflection on the EMMAUS Story by Paulist Father Joe Scott

In today's gospel, two disciples are on a journey. It's significant that they are on a journey AWAY from Jerusalem. Jesus' disciples have been traveling TO Jerusalem for most of Luke's gospel, and now they are IN Jerusalem celebrating the exciting news that Jesus has risen and appeared to them. But these two disciples are going in the opposite direction. And they are downcast, discouraged, sad. Even though they've heard some news about the resurrection, it hasn't yet come alive for them. By the end of this story, however, these two disciples ARE filled with joy and are making their way back to Jerusalem. What happened to change their hearts?

They meet a stranger on the road, and he walks with them, explaining the meaning of the Scriptures. This is certainly one of the ways we experience Jesus' presence in our lives. We listen to the gospel each Sunday. This is important, but not quite enough. But when these two disciples reach their home, the stranger begins to walk on down the road.

The two disciples realize that it is evening, it's getting dark, and it's dangerous to be on the road at night. They invite this stranger to share a meal with them and spend the night under their roof. And through this generous and indeed risky act of hospitality—they don't know who this man is, he could be a robber himself—but through their hospitality they recognize that this stranger is Jesus in their midst. Luke describes the meal they are sharing as having all the actions of a Eucharist, showing that for these earliest of Christians the Eucharist is not just about worship but about hospitality.

One of the largest questions that faces us in our church, in our nation and in our world is: how hospitable are we willing to be to the stranger? We no longer live in a tight knit neighborhoods or small towns where everyone knows everyone else. At the same time, we live in an incredibly diverse society where each day we encounter people of every race, language and religion. Outside of our small circle of family and friends, almost everyone we meet on a typical day is a stranger.

You might remember that a few Lents back, Pope Francis asked that we give money to the homeless persons we see on the street, without worrying about how they might spend the money. When I heard Pope Francis said this I thought, "Boy, I could never do that." I'm not a generous person by nature. I'm stingy with my time, talent and treasure.

But Pope Francis made this request just before Lent began, and his words stuck in my mind. I found myself thinking, instead of giving up chocolate why not try giving up some of my money to a homeless person each day of Lent? I told myself, I don't have to decide whether this is a wise or foolish thing to do. I'm doing it because Pope Francis asked me to.

With Lent transformed into Easter, I can guarantee that I didn't solve the problem of homelessness in San Francisco. Nor did I make a significant difference in the life of any homeless person. I may now and again have helped someone buy a cup of coffee or a sandwich. What really began to change this Lent was MY heart. Some of the fear I've always felt confronting a ragged stranger on the street began to diminish. Rather than feeling vaguely guilty or disappointed in myself in my usual habit of turning away from some bedraggled soul and pretending he or she wasn't there, I would return home from my walks and the graceful encounters that followed filled up with a burst of energy that started my day on the right foot.

Today's gospel tells us that if we want to experience the joy the disciples felt when they discovered the Lord Jesus alive and with them, the quickest way to do that is to extend hospitality to a stranger. Each of us must find our own way of doing that. But try it. See what happens!
