Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

CELEBRATING THANKSGIVING IN A TIME OF BAD NEWS

In my family, we ate turnips on Thanksgiving. It was the only time this vegetable ever appeared on our dinner table. They had a uniquely bitter taste, and for my mother were hard to find in the shopping mart. I don't know if they were hard to cook. But turnips graced our table every Thanksgiving.

In her older years, my mother revealed that she had never liked turnips, and my father hadn't liked them either. But HIS mother had served them every Thanksgiving, perhaps a legacy of her Irish roots. For my dad, it just wouldn't be Thanksgiving without turnips according to my grandmother's recipe, even though the leftovers mysteriously disappeared on Friday morning.

Years later, after my dad had left us for the greatest Feast of all, I would have lunch with my mother on my day off. We usually ate at a steak house, which served a great salmon and baked potato. When Mom grew older, and could no longer live on her own, I would visit her at the care home where she now lived. She didn't like the food there, but she did enjoy the Big Macs and French Fries from the nearby McDonald's.

In those months, she was very angry at me for the loss of her home and independence. Sometimes she would say nothing to me during our meal, at least nothing nice. But I would watch her eat, and it did mean a lot to me that she so obviously enjoyed that hamburger and fries. We ate this same lunch, week after week, now too many years ago. I don't eat Big Macs anymore, but I always have a catch in my heart when I pass a McDonald's.

On November 28, 1963, Americans gathered by tradition to their homes to celebrate Thanksgiving. The President of the United States had been assassinated six days before. His burial had occurred four days before the feast. It's astonishing to me now that we didn't cancel Thanksgiving. But as with my grandmother's turnips, it just wouldn't have seemed right.

We didn't postpone Thanksgiving. We roasted the turkey and baked the pumpkin pie. Our conversations may have been a bit subdued at first, but most of us gradually warmed to the joys and challenges of gathering with family, even with that aching awareness of a larger loss.

We associate Thanksgiving with the pilgrims at Plymouth Rock in 1642. But it was another American President, Abraham Lincoln, who created this national observance in 1863, during the height of the Civil War. Americans suffered more casualties during this war dividing our North and South than any other war to this date.

We would wisely still pray the last words of Lincoln's proclamation: "I recommend that while offering up the ascriptions justly due God for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidable engaged, and fervently implore the imposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and restore it as soon as it may be consistent for the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and Union.

Each November, we gather with our not so perfect family and our sinful church and our deeply divided nation. We gather because, having been nourished by this ritual of food and memory for so long, we cannot NOT be here. We must be here, because we still believe that God is here, even though we are so often not at all Godlike. And who but God can help free us from the mess we're in?
