
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PARISH MISSION STATEMENT

OLD SAINT MARY'S, built in 1854 as California's first Cathedral, was the first Cathedral to be named in honor of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception. The Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to



meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old cathedral. Notes from the Paulist

PALM SUNDAY: THE PASSION OF JESUS IN THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

The world is full of tragedy. Some of it is nature-caused: floods, fires, earthquakes. Some of it is called by hatred: the mass shootings, the attacks against Asians and immigrants. Some of it caused by the powerful preying on the vulnerable—witness the Russian attack against the Ukraine. I'm always impressed by the heroes in these times—those who know how to organize a rescue, or who run toward the gunfire in order to save others. I often wonder: could I do that? Would I respond to such a crisis with courage and concern for others? The honest truth is, I don't know.

Jesus, in Luke's gospel, is a man equipped to respond to a crisis. In Mark's gospel, Jesus cries out in the midst of his very human anguish. In John's gospel, Jesus seems more Divine than human. He directs his trial and crucifixion as though he were managing a stage or conducting an orchestra.

Luke's gospel is different. The Greek word "agon^y", as the great scripture scholar Raymond Brown notes, is not a description of suffering as much as it is the kind of emotion an athlete would possess, having trained well and ready to begin a great contest.

Luke's gospel stresses the prayerfulness of Jesus. He prays before and after every major event. He frequently goes off by himself to pray. We can understand him as training for battle, confident that his preparation will bear fruit. Now for Luke, Jesus is very human, but he's also filled with a remarkable tranquility and composure.

Many years ago, I went to a sweat lodge conducted by a member of the Lakota nation. It meant sitting for over two hours in a small tent filled with intense heat. The heat would increase every 15 minutes. I discovered that the only way I could survive this was to pray. As soon as my mind wandered, I would start to panic. When I focused back on my prayer, I could bear the heat. It was only by prayer that I was able to survive the ordeal.

Luke's gospel also stresses the forgiveness of Jesus, which embodies and teaches the forgiveness of his heavenly Father. It is only in the account given in Luke's gospel that Jesus actually witnesses Peter's denial. Jesus sees with his own two eyes that Peter has abandoned him in his moment of need. And yet, with those same eyes, Jesus forgives him. Peter's own eyes are now blinded with tears of remorse.

Watch Jesus as he walks through his Passion. He always leads from a place of love. Not anger, not fear, not regret, not violence, only love. When Peter cuts off the ear of a soldier in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus responds by healing the wound of the one who will march him to his death. When the "good thief" next to Jesus on the cross recognizes his innocence, Jesus welcomes him into paradise that very day. But notice, he doesn't condemn the "bad thief" either!

Luke is the only gospel to note Jews in the crowd who were not disciples, but were nevertheless sad to witness an innocent man's suffering. To those who condemn, revile and abuse Jesus, his response is: "Father, forgive them, they do not know what they are doing."

St. Paul understood the crucifixion of Jesus to be an atonement for all the sins of humanity, from Adam onward. In the 11th century, St. Anselm developed a theology of "atonement" that has had an enormous influence on our understanding of the meaning of Jesus' death ever since.

But **Luke** uses a different kind of language about the Passion of Jesus. In Luke's understanding, Jesus brings life NOT because he dies, but because he forgives. As Raymond Brown describes it, "**the crucifixion is a moment of GOD's forgiveness and healing grace, through and by Jesus.**"

We must ALL face the Passion of our own suffering and death. Training our hearts to lead from a place of love, prayer and forgiveness is a good way---perhaps the only way---to prepare for this contest.


