OLD SAINT MARY'S, built in 1854 as California's

The Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet



new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old cathedral. WELCOME TO OLD SAINT MARY'S CATHEDRAL

A GIFT FROM THE EAST: OUR ASIAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FR. JOE SCOTT



I am so grateful to live in an Asian American community!

To those of us who worship at Old St. Mary's Cathedral and live in Chinatown, Asian Americans are NOT the other. They are our neighbors, parishioners, colleagues in ministry, friends and extended family members. They enrich our lives.

Long before the Paulist Fathers came, Old St. Mary's Cathedral was a home for Chinese families. When the Cathedral was dedicated in 1854, the Chinese were already our neighbors. They came in 1849, as the village of Yerba Buena was transforming into an explosion of urban energy named for the saint who called all creation his brothers and sisters. Chinese parents served as principals and teachers and athletic coaches to make St. Mary's School thrive for so many years.

America has not always treated its Chinese residents justly. In 1882 the Congress passed the Chinese Exclusion Act. Those whose blood and sweat had helped to build our national railroad system were suddenly unwelcome. This was the first time in our history we had excluded a people from our shores not due to the threat of war, but simply because they were not white. This law was renewed in 1892 and 1902, but quietly repealed in 1943, when China had become a needed ally in World War II.

In 1924, the Congress passed an Immigration Act which strongly limited any immigration except that from northern Europe. Growing up in the 1950's in New Hampshire, the only immigrants I ever met were French Canadian (not counting my Irish and Italian relatives in Boston!)

I grew up comfortable in a white American middle-class world. I didn't go to school or church with any Asian Americans. The Asian characters I saw in movies were always portrayed as sinister or clownish. I learned to be afraid of the former and laugh at the latter. Much later, I learned that the Asian parts in movies were played only by white Americans because some wonderful Asian actors were prohibited from exercising their talents. How many Chinese or Japanese Oscar winners can you recall? It's not from a want of talent!

Bigotry and violence inflected upon innocent people are the actions most hateful to the gospel. Jesus ministers equally to Jews and Samaritans, women and men, rich and poor. In his letter to the Galatians (3:28) St. Paul says:" There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free person, there is not male or female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." Paul does not mean that in Jesus all people are exactly alike, he means that in Jesus all people are equal in their human dignity and their capacity for love.

In 1965 Congress passed a much different Immigration Act, which made possible the multi-ethnic nation we know today. This has been the cause of fear and anger among some, but for me it has been a blessing to get to know people whose ancestors and experiences are so different from my own.

After years of nearsightedness, I'm able to see long distance, and in much brighter colors, thanks to the skill of a Chinese doctor who removed my cataracts. I marvel at the efficiency of our Chinatown post office, after experiencing regular long lines in another city I will not mention. On Sunday at Old St. Mary's, we have a Chinese American choir in English at the 9 am Mass, a Chinese choir singing in Cantonese at 11 and a music director and pianist who hail from Japan. The music is different at each, sometimes unfamiliar, but always beautiful and prayerful. On Sundays we also have birthday parties in our parish hall, with delicious food catered from the Far East Cafe. I've learned to enjoy and celebrate the Chinese New Year and the Autumn Moon festival, and now look forward to their coming each year. At Old St. Mary's I've met Chinese, Japanese, Vietnamese and Filipino parishioners who each and all enrich our community of faith and friendship.

Perhaps one of the most beautiful Chinese customs is the veneration of ancestors. We observed this at Old St. Mary's on the Sunday of the new year of the dragon. Respect for the elders. It angers me that our elderly Chinese parishioners and neighbors cannot take a walk in the fresh air, so important to survive sheltering in place, without feeling nervous or afraid. Let's not be comfortable with this. Let's not tolerate this in San Francisco or Oakland or anywhere else. Let's let our elders know they are not alone. For God's sake, let's be good Samaritans for one another!
