A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

WELCOME TO OLD SAINT MARY'S CATHEDRAL

FRIEND OR FOE? (Part Two) A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FATHER JOE SCOTT

I'm old enough to remember the Cuban Missile Crisis in October of 1962. At the time, I was 16 years old. I mostly remember how scared everyone was, including me! The news announcer was preparing us for nuclear destruction. No one thought of turning off their television---

In 1962 we DID have an enemy, and I had no doubt about who it was. I had been taught well. At every Catholic Mass, we prayed for the conversion of the communist atheists in the Soviet Union. A communist atheist was the worst thing one could be, and we tended to suspect that people we didn't like at school were among them!

Some of the students and even teachers argued that conversion will take way too long, we should kill them before they killed us. When the Cuban Missile crisis began, and we traveled toward what the news announcers had named "DEFCON 1" (Defense readiness condition) —total nuclear destruction—none of my friends, nor I, were surprised. We KNEW this was coming. We said the prayers we say when we know we are going to die.

Thanks be to God and a lot of hard work by some VERY serious military and government folks, we survived!

Five months later, in August of 1963, a sobered President of the United States gave a speech at the American University. In that speech, he said something I had never heard any of my fellow Americans say before, even our nuns and priests.

He said: "Let us not be blind to our differences with the Soviet Union, but let us also direct our attention to our common interests and to the means by which those differences can be resolved. And if we cannot now end our differences, we can at least make our world safe for diversity. For, in the final analysis, our most basic common link is that we all inhabit this small planet. We all breathe the same air. We all cherish our children's future. And we are all mortal."

Historians tell us that almost no Americans heard or even heard ABOUT the President's speech at the time it was given. Its words may have been just too different than what we Cold Warriors were ready to hear.

But one person who DID listen to this speech was the also sobered leader of the Soviet Union, Nikita Khrushchev. He made sure that this speech by an American President was published in every newspaper in the Soviet Union. Did the Russian people listen to this speech any more attentively than we Americans did?

I DO know that shortly thereafter, The United States of America and the Soviet Union signed the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, which brought things back down to **DEFCON 5.** This meant it was safe to enjoy the sunny skies and the beach, and for quite a time thereafter.

Today we are blessed to have no big enemies threatening nuclear destruction against the United States, at least not today or tomorrow. But why do we seem so angry and threatened by people who are different from us here at home? Why are we so afraid? Don't we all breathe the same air? Don't we all cherish our children?
