WELCOME TO OLD SAINT MARY'S CATHEDRAL

DO YOU EVER FEEL SORRY FOR JOHN THE BAPTIST?

Do you ever feel sorry for John the Baptist? I do! It might be more accurate to say, I feel sympathy for him. He has a tough job in the gospels. John the Baptist appears in all four of those gospels. He's the only one, aside from Jesus, who rates an infancy narrative and a passion narrative. Jesus himself says that there is no one born of a woman who is greater than John the Baptist. He is the last, and the most important, of the prophets, at least in Christian telling.

And yet, John's role in the gospels is to be **second best.** And who, in OUR world, wants to be second best?

John is what we like to call, in our political campaigns, an advanced person. An advanced person is VERY important to a campaign. The advanced person is the first to come to a city, or small town, to announce the beginning of the campaign. This person meets as many as he can, but never talks about himself. The advance person talks about the future President nobody knows about yet. When the _____yet unknown, future President finally comes to town, the advance person is the one who shouts: "There he is, he's the one I've been talking about all this time."

The advanced person introduces the candidate's first speech, and when the candidate starts to specify, the advanced person goes to the back of the crowd, where no one can see him.

When the candidate becomes President, the advance person generally gets a job doing something somewhere in the president's office. And, you might have noticed that he or she usually leaves that job quickly once the new leader starts feeling his oats. He or she is not needed anymore. I have never heard an instance of an advance person becoming president of the United States. The advanced person's job is to eventually disappear.

That's John the Baptist. His is a job that requires humility. Humility means truth. It means looking at myself and not thinking of myself too big and not thinking of myself too small. It's having an accurate sense of my own strengths and weaknesses, and what's best for me to do, with this short life that I have.

A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FR. JOE SCOTT

John the Baptist appears to be the kind of man who had a big ego. He was comfortable in his own skin. He was willing to speak up, and loudly, for his own truth. And he was not afraid to tell a VERY uncomfortable truth to a VERY powerful tyrant no matter what the cost to him.

Although we might not guess it, if we read some of the passages in John's gospel, Jesus also had a healthy sense of HIS own truth. When the crowds tried to put a crown on his head, Jesus hid away in the desert. *He said: "only the Father knows, and I'm not the Father."*

Jesus was never working for his own advancement. He was working for coming of the time when the God who is love oversaw everything. Jesus never asked to have a Church named after him. He wanted love in charge, not him. He was working for the rule of love, no matter what sacrifices HE had to make on love's behalf.

John the Baptist and Jesus are cousins in confronting each **one** of us with this truth regarding life. It's not about me. We all have a part to play, but only God is in charge. We must spend our lifetime learning how to let go and let God. It's only by dying to ourselves that God teaches us how to live.
