# DID JESUS TAKE A SUMMER VACATION? A REFLECTION BY FR. JOE SCOTT



L very summer I find myself remembering moments from those wonderful long weeks of school vacation during my growing up years in Southern California...swimming at the beach in Santa Monica, or at least splashing in the waves and eating our favorite picnic food of fried chicken with butter-and-sugar sandwiches on Wonder Bread....visiting San Francisco for the first time with my family and devouring ice cream at the Ghirardelli Chocolate Factory...seeing a black bear up close as he sniffed curiously around the edges of our tent in the valley below Yosemite's half dome. Summer was a time to forsake well-worn routines and hang out with my buddies and discover the excitement of new places.

We don't know whether Jesus ever took a summer vacation. The scriptures are disappointingly silent on this. But the gospels do show Jesus inviting his closest companions to take time off with him so they could all rest and replenish their energy.

If we read the gospels carefully, we notice three patterns of being in Jesus' life. There are times he spends at work, ministering to the crowds of people who appeal to him in their need, or announcing the kingdom of God in new towns and villages. Jesus also makes a point of spending special time with friends like Peter and John, Martha and Mary and Lazarus. We see him attending a wedding, relaxing, delighting in conversation, savoring good food and drink. Finally, we discover that Jesus takes time apart, in deserted places, to reflect on his mission and encounter his Father in quiet and solitude.

These three ways of being were not always perfectly balanced in Jesus' life. Sometimes he set aside plans for a well-earned rest to help someone who truly needed his compassion at just that moment. Yet it seems he made a real effort to open his life to moments of leisure and friendship as ways of relishing the richness of God's creation. Jesus' parables reveal his deep appreciation for nature. I have no doubt he often enjoyed the beauty of a sunset or the sound of the waves lapping against the shores of Gennesaret.

In this Jesus was much in tune with the ancient Jewish tradition of Sabbath time. Sabbath is not exactly a cherished word in our own day. If we think of it at all, we may regard Sabbath as a day when we must go to church while forbidden to do fun things like shopping. But in Jewish practice the Sabbath day was precisely set aside for experiencing joy and delight in the company of loved ones. True rest and leisure nourish our capacity for wonder, an essential step toward encountering the presence of God especially in the ordinary, everyday incidents of our lives.

Do you ever hear Jesus inviting you to "come apart....and rest a while." What's your response?

Summer, with its warmer, longer evenings and perhaps even some days of paid vacation can give us a chance to spend more time outdoors, to slow down a bit, to try something we've wanted to experience but haven't yet found the time. May these months create for you a time to discover a few quiet and restful moments outside and within, where God's presence waits ready to refresh your drooping spirits.

#### **ELEVENTH SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME, JUNE 18, 2023**

### **Corpus Christi**

Last weekend we celebrated the Feast of Corpus Christi - our annual celebration of the meaning of the Eucharist in our Catholic faith. Each time we gather for Mass, we celebrate Christ present to us in the Scriptures we hear proclaimed, in the Eucharistic bread and wine we receive at communion, in the presence of the priest-presider, and in the community of faithful believers gathered for the celebration.

When we only experience Mass "on line", we miss two of those ways Christ becomes present to us at Mass in the church: in the gathered community of faithful believers and in receiving holy communion. Those of you who were there will remember we talked about the importance of these aspects of Christ's presence in the discussion led by Fr. Steve Bossi in the auditorium during our pancake breakfast.

The time to reflect on these meanings of "the Body of Christ" is this week as we move on into the season of Ordinary Time. Two questions the members of our Old St. Mary's Community might ask this week: Am I committed to attending Mass in person regularly as I live out my participation in the Body of Christ that is the Church, and am I willing to encourage others to join us weekly at Mass as we build up the Body of Christ here in our parish? This would be a good time to think about people you know who you might encourage to join you for Mass at Old St. Mary's in the coming weeks.
