Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

PETER WALKING ON WATER

The story of Jesus walking on water is a remarkable one. No other gospel has inspired so many jokes, mostly about golf, a game not yet invented in Jesus' time. Jesus' walking on water is not the point of this gospel. PETER walking on water is.

Matthew wrote his gospel fifty years after Jesus' walk on this earth had ended. Can you remember anything you were doing fifty years ago?

Matthew and his readers had no podcasts to remember how Jesus walked, or what his voice sounded like. They didn't even have a photograph. Most of those who would have remembered that voice had died. The memory of the remarkable person who had inspired so many people to call themselves Christian was fading away.

Matthew's contemporaries are living in a church that has become much more turbulent within its ranks and without than even the stormy winds of the Sea of Galilee. They are asking themselves: "How can we remain faithful, when it's costing so much of our peace of mind and heart, and maybe our lives as well"?

These Christians NEED Peter. We Christians need Peter. Peter, in this gospel, is what Jesus calls a person of little faith. He has enough faith to get out of the boat and begin walking step by step on the turbulent sea. So long as his attention is focused on Jesus, he can do it.

But when he realizes: "this sea is so rough, and I'm so small", Peter begins to sink. His attention is no longer on Jesus, but upon himself, and his own fear sinks him

That's what "little faith" means. I have it, maybe you have it. Peter loves Jesus, he knows Jesus loves him, but he can't take the extra step of letting go of his own fear.

I know something of what Peter is feeling. Many years ago, I was part of a sweat lodge organized by an old wise man of the Lakota nation.

The sweat lodge was a prayer with four parts. I don't know how long it lasted because nobody mentioned the time. We gathered in a circle in a small tent.

A Reflection by Paulist Father Joe Scott

Our leader poured water on rocks that had been fired into intense heat. It got much hotter than any sauna. The prayer was divided into four sessions, called "endurances." At the beginning of every one of the four "endurances", the leader would heat up the fire to an even greater intensity. For each endurance there would be a different prayer for us to pray.

Almost as soon as the tent flapped closed, I wanted to escape. Outside the tent were cool breezes and bottles of fresh water. Then, I discovered that whenever my mind wandered, whenever I focused on myself and my own misery, I panicked.

But when I got back to the prayer I was praying, I was able to stay put. While praying, I was able to keep God closer to the center of my attention. What also kept me in the tent was the awareness that every other person in my circle was praying with me. I knew that I was not alone.

And yes, I made it through the four endurances to the end. And it was not all misery. I received some blessings from the sweat lodge that have guided me to this day. I must admit, though, I've never been tempted to do another one. It was tough and challenging, like living in the world is tough and challenging.

St. Peter was a fearful man, like me, who more than once wanted to quit the ship. But when he was finally martyred in Rome, crucified upside down, they say, I imagine his eyes were fixed on Jesus.

For many years, I've passed by cars with bumperstickers bearing the words, "What would Jesus do?"

I used to smile at this, even thinking about the bearers of this message as Jesus freaks. But one day I realized: this is truly a great prayer.

So, I try. Some days I get overwhelmed by the stress and anger all around me and us in our world. But when it starts to get too much for me, I return to what has become my prayer: "what would Jesus do? And can I make an effort to do as Jesus would do? To do what his example would suggest? I try to pray this prayer because I believe it's what St. Peter would have done. Want to try it for yourself?
