Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

ALL SOULS DAY AND THE DAY OF THE DEAD A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FATHER JOE SCOTT



A few years ago, the feature length cartoon and Academy Award winner *Coco* introduced us to the Day of the Dead (*El Dia de los Muertos*). Mexico has observed this day for as long as anyone remembers.

One of the benefits of living in a country, state, and city where our neighbors hark from so many birthlands is that we can't help but experience the treasures of people who once seemed far away but now live right next door. In my Chinatown neighborhood I can visit two Buddhist Temples within a two-minute walk —and those are only the two I know about!

On November 2, San Francisco celebrates *El Dia de los Muertos* at our oldest Catholic church (Dolores Mission) and many other neighborhoods as well. Sometimes the festivities last a week. The events of this day are part of our multicultural city. They are now part of being American. Perhaps even more, they are a cherished part of our Catholic heritage.

Whether we name it All Soul's Day or the Day of the Dead, on November 2 we remember with respect, affection, and prayers those who lie in their tombs. On the Feast of All Saints (November 1) we remember infants or children who have died. In a very real way, we don't need to pray for them, but we can certainly ask these innocents to pray for us, for they are angels in heaven. Pope Benedict XVI assured us that we can trust in God's love for infants who died before they could be baptized, for grace has no boundaries and Divine love has no limits.

On November 2, our prayerful attention turns toward adults. Some traditions that accompany *El Dia de los Muertos* can remind us of Halloween. Children go door to door, costumed as citizens of the Land of the Dead. The treat they seek is *calacas*, a small candy formed in the image of a skull or skeleton.

There is a significant difference between the two events. However. on Halloween the skeletons are meant to scare us. On the Day of the Dead the skeletons are Uncle Juan and Grandma Rosa whom we love and who love us. The complementary settings for the Day of the Dead are home and cemetery. In our living room an altar appears bearing photos of those who have died alongside images of Jesus and Mary and favorite saints.

In the kitchen, our family gathers to prepare the favorite foods of the dearly departed. During their lives on earth, we shared tamales or *posole* with them at so many meals festive and ordinary. Now we carry them and *Pan de Muertos* in picnic baskets to their graves to share yet one more meal together. We remember that Jesus, as the grave loomed fearfully near for him, urged his friends to remember him by sharing the bread and wine they had enjoyed so often before.

Like Halloween and Christmas, *El Dia de los Muertos* has roots in pagan pre-history. Yet it's useful to recall how Christian, indeed how Catholic, this day is.

We believers affirm that we are members of a community of faith and love that the grave cannot conquer. We pray for the dead and they pray for us. They remain a part of our family. And if we can experience the risen Lord in the breaking of the bread, why can't Grandpa and Grandma be especially present to us when we share a picnic close by their tombstones with all the love that sparkles in our memories?

The death of someone we love breaks our hearts. It's as though we have been shattered into pieces. The most well-meant words cannot comfort. To heal takes time. Time and faith, and now and again, a good loving meal shared with family and friends.

El Dia de los Muertos is one day of the year which encourages us to look deeply yet playfully into the face of death, to dance with joy in its frightful presence, to pluck the thorn of grief and anoint its wound with the healing balm of faith, hope and love. We do this not in spite of, but BECAUSE death is so shattering. Only God can put the pieces back together. And we believe God does, in the Spirit of Jesus we meet still among us.
