WELCOME TO OLD SAINT MARY'S CATHEDRAL

THE RISEN CHRIST AND THE HOLY SPIRIT

A REFLECTION ON EASTER BY PAULIST FR. JOE SCOTT



During the Easter Season, the first reading is always from the Acts of the Apostles. It's an unusual New Testament book in many ways.

First of all, it's the only sequel to an earlier story. We are used to sequels of books and movies but this was not so common in the first century. Luke wrote his gospel before he wrote this sequel. Luke was a planner and an organizer. He believed that God had foreordained three great Ages for the human race.

The first was the Age of the Prophets, which was focused on the Jewish people whose stories were told in the Old Testament. In Luke's understanding, the last of the prophets, and therefore the last of the Old Testament, is John the Baptist. In Luke's story of Jesus' birth, Simeon and Anna and even the parents of John (Zachariah and Elizabeth) are actually Old Testament people.

Jesus' baptism begins the second Age of Jesus, which is recorded in Luke's gospel.

The third and final Age of the Holy Spirit begins with Jesus' Ascension into Heaven and the coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples at Pentecost. We are still living in the Age of the Holy Spirit. The inauguration of this new age is the subject of the Acts of the Apostles.

Another unique feature of the Acts of the Apostles: it is the only travelogue found in the New Testament. We are familiar with travelogues like "The Travels of Marco Polo" or Jules Verne's "Around the World in 80 Days." The Acts of the Apostles is a similar travel story, but a highly symbolic one. It's really about the journeys of the Holy Spirit after Pentecost.

Luke begins his gospel with Zachariah the priest in the Temple of Jerusalem. He ends with the disciples joyfully gathered in the Temple to praise God for the gift of Jesus' resurrection. Jerusalem and the Temple are the beginning and the end and the central holy spaces of Luke's gospel.

With the Acts of the Apostles a journey begins from "Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." In Acts the journey begins in Jerusalem but ends in Rome, the capital city of the Roman Empire which spread through the whole world.

One thing to note is that Acts is a very selective account of the early years of the church. We know from other sources that a large and influential community existed in Alexandria, Egypt, but Acts mentions nothing of this. Ancient Catholic tradition contains mostly legendary accounts of the missionary travels of each of the twelve apostles, such as Thomas' visit to India. Acts shows little interest in the post-resurrection lives of any of the twelve except for Peter, John and James. The focus of Acts is mostly on Paul, who is never mentioned even in Luke's gospel.

In writing the Acts of the Apostles, Luke has one disappointing and perhaps embarrassing fact to face. The Jews, Jesus' own people, by-and-large did not accept his message. The Samaritans and the Gentiles, to whom Jesus did not preach, became the post-resurrection converts to his message. Was this evidence of a failure, or rather a revelation of the Holy Spirit's surprising plan?

In Luke's understanding, Jesus and Paul fulfill the prophecies of Isaiah. Isaiah was unique among the Old Testament prophets in predicting that the Jewish people would be part of God's plan to reveal his Divine truth to the entire world.

The Holy Spirit frees these early Christians from the confines of Jerusalem, the Temple, and even the Law of Moses, to bring the essential truth of the God revealed to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob to the far corners of the earth.

May your Easter season be filled with joy!
