THE MYSTERY IN THE MANGER

In our time and place, the anti-hero of Christmas may well be King Herod the Great. He was nothing if not successful. He gained fame as a builder, overseeing the construction of a temple that was one of the wonders of his world. He was feared for his violent anger. He murdered his own sons, expecting that they would grow up to overthrow him. He massacred countless innocent children in hopes of eliminating the newborn King of the Jews. His magnificent palace was not a place of comfort and joy. In the Christmas gospels, Herod represents the love of power which brings death. Joseph, Mary, Elizabeth and Jesus represent the power of love which brings life.



Joseph is a quiet man who could be the best listener of all time. He utters not a word that saw print. He is attentive to the angel and attentive to Mary, providing the care, respect and support she needs to do God's will. Joseph is not without courage. When Mary and her baby are threatened by none other than Herod himself, he risks the indignities of an immigrant in a strange land to provide them with safety and life itself.

Mary and her cousin Elizabeth make Christmas happen. Have you ever noticed that for years untold, women have been the primary creators of Christmas? So often it is women who write and send the cards, cook the turkey, take the kids to see Santa Claus, decorate their church with garlands, often with time squeezed out from their other work.

In Luke's account, Mary and Elizabeth are not about themselves. They're about nurturing each other and the child each will birth. In doing so, they give voice to the tidings of great joy. Together, in blessing each other, they speak a joy that will answer the long yearning of Israel for a God who will lift up the lowly and cast the mighty from their thrones. Words that King Herod would not like to hear!

How would we be able to understand the true meaning of Christmas without the words of Mary and Elizabeth? In nearly fifty years as a priest, I've been taught by so many Marys and Elizabeths who have spoken the gospel to me in their words and actions. I have come to truly believe that the gospel will not be preached clearly until men and women share as equal and full partners in its proclamation.

The fourth bearer of Christmas is Jesus, not the articulate, empowered man who preaches and heals and travels and leads, but an infant not yet capable of speech and bound up in swaddling clothes as confining as nails on a cross. This newborn does nothing but what WE'RE asked to do: trust in the love we name God, given in the presence of two parents who are poor, but rich in care.

Strangely enough, we worship a God who greets us not as a mighty king or a movie star or a corporate executive or a guru from a mountain top, but as a baby, naked and voiceless and vulnerable, who gets right down there with the sheep and the oxen.

Whenever we meet a person who needs our love, or a person who needs our care, we meet the Divine. Do we believe this? Whatever the external circumstances of our world, Christ will happen when WE make him happen, just as Joseph and Mary and Elizabeth made him happen way back in year zero. We have the power to do so, and the power is love!

When we come to this, we have uncovered the mystery revealed in the manger!


