

MARCH 19 IS ST. JOSEPH's DAY

A Reflection by Paulist Father Joe Scott

St. Joseph is a fascinating character in the stories of Jesus' birth, because we learn so few details about his life, yet know everything we need to know. He is a quiet man who never utters a word in the Scriptures. We learn that he is a descendent of David, but Matthew and Luke confuse matters by giving us different names for his father. Matthew's gospel calls Joseph "a righteous man," meaning that he observed the Law of Moses carefully. He lived and died as an observant Jew.



Jesus is referred to in the gospel of Mark as a carpenter, and in the gospel of Matthew as the son of a carpenter This is to be expected, as sons, particularly first born, inherited the trade of their father. The Greek word "tekton" can simply imply a worker in word or stone (the latter being the building material more commonly found in Galilee). In a small village like Nazareth (about 200 townspeople in Jesus' time), a carpenter could have been as poor as a farmer or shepherd. Jesus grew up in a home whose only abundance was love.

Matthew tells us that Joseph treated his betrothed with tact and consideration, "unwilling to expose her to shame." In the Middle East, shame was the worst thing that could happen to you, and it spilled over to your family as well. These few words of Matthew reveal that this man was someone, of whatever age, able to step beyond his own hurt and confusion to do what was best for the woman with whom he hoped to build a future.

The Scriptures do not tell us how long Joseph lived, or how he died, or in what way he was present to the lives of his household in Nazareth. What they do tell us is how the image of "father" prayed a crucial role in enlivening the heart of Jesus.

Perhaps his most memorable parable told of a father who yearns for his wayward son, with a love beyond condition, who, at the first rumor of his return home, hurried down the road to meet him more than halfway.

Jesus called God "abba", an intimate and affectionate term for one's father. He urged his disciples to see God as their "abba" as well, to feel welcome in the home of one who had prepared a place for them, like a carpenter crafting a hearth and home. In his quiet, faithful way, Joseph must have fostered an awareness in the child Jesus that the meaning of life is to be found in self-sacrificing love. If so, he played a more important part than we may realize in the story of his adopted son.


