SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE? A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FR. JOE SCOTT

My first assignment after ordination was to St. Mark's University parish near Santa Barbara. As the youngster on the parish staff, I was delegated to be one of the chaperons on a trip for the teenagers to Magic Mountain, an amusement park about two hours distant. All went well until two of the teenagers disappeared. It turned out the older sister had convinced the younger to hide out so they could spend the night exploring the many amusements all by themselves. Magic Mountain may have been their idea of the Temple in Jerusalem.

When our bus returned home with the other passengers, I and another chaperon stayed. We learned a lot about Magic Mountain security. The Park closed at midnight during which all the exits were watched. When every customer departed, the guards went to work. The teenagers' parents had been notified and were already on their way to Valencia. In those days Rt. 126 was considered the most dangerous night driving in California, all winding roads, and no lights. Not encouraging to a parents' patience.

The Park guards located our lost sheep about 1:30 am. Yes, they had found a great hiding place! All ended happily, but I imagine this was a night when there was not much sleeping in heavenly peace for either the two sisters or their parents.

Luke's story tells us that Jesus went into the Temple when he was twelve years old--about the same age as those young sisters who decided to break free from the constraints of adult rule. Mary and Joseph are relieved to find him, but I've always wondered what sort of scolding they gave Jesus on their way home to Nazareth.

The Catholic Scripture scholar Raymond Brown notes that the stories of Jesus' birth are always about his adult life and mission. His actions as a child forecast his actions as Messiah and Son of God. In Mark's gospel, there is a surprising story about Jesus' mother and blood relatives looking for him because they think he is "out of his mind." They want to put him away somewhere where he won't cause any trouble. (Mark 3:21...31-34).

Jesus' not surprising response is that his true mother and brothers and sisters are his disciples. We Catholics have made the Feast of the Holy Family a celebration of our families and of family life. Jesus doesn't provide much Scriptural basis for this. He often speaks of family ties as one of the worldly allegiances tempting his disciples to look backward. Did his own family life hold tensions we'd rather not remember?

With all of that, the story of young Jesus in the Temple dismissing the fears of his worried and distraught parents strikes us as true to life. When a young couple open their love to share with offspring, they open themselves to a world of pain. The cute baby who challenges our sleep will grow up to be the daughter who refuses to set foot in our church, or the perfect son who hesitatingly reveals to us that he is gay. Parenthood—life, in fact--breaks our hearts, but only (in order) to break them open. Can we love whom we can't control? Can we affirm a goodness revealed in a way different from our own familiar paths? This is the very dilemma confronting Mary and Joseph in hearing the demanding words of their far from docile son—much as it confronts parents in every time and place.

Jesus' words bear a challenge even for those of us who are not parents. If we want to be good Catholic Christians, we must grow beyond our comfort zone. Twelve-year-old Jesus speaks to me urging: "Grow up. Stop clinging to your immaturity. Work hard to overcome your prejudices, your resentments, your selfishness. Forgive. Be generous. Reach out to include the person you don't know, and the person you don't love. Do my father's work, which is love itself."
