A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

HURT HURTS A Reflection by Paulist Father Joe Scott



"Hurt hurts." I heard this expression used by someone on a radio program. This saying has probably been around for years, but this is the first time I heard it, or perhaps the first time I paid attention to it.

"Hurt hurts" intrigues me because of its double meaning. First, when we're hurt we feel unhappy. Feeling hurt is uncomfortable. There's a pain in our heart we want to get rid of. It's easy when we're hurt to became self-centered because it's so hard to ignore the pain we are carrying with us.

"Hurt hurts" in another way as well. When I am hurt, I have an urge to hurt someone else. If I'm unjustly treated at work, I come home and am nasty to my spouse, who gets angry, perhaps unfairly, at our son, who kicks the dog, who bites the cat. Hurt is contagious. It can spread like a wildfire.

School bullies can seem terrifying, but they are carrying around a world of hurt in their hearts. The attacks in our streets against innocent Asian people are rooted in racism, but are also, sadly, the rages of hurt hearts.

The sad thing is, being hurtful to others doesn't really heal our hurt. Jesus talked about "hardness of heart." Some of us carry around hearts like rocks. They're so heavy we can barely move.

My heart goes out to the homeless screamers we hear as we go to work along San Francisco streets. They voice the pain of so many who bear the burdens of daily living quietly but die a little more inside each day.

One thing we can say about Jesus is that he knew what it was like to be insulted and spit on. He knew what it was like to be the object of a hatred he didn't deserve. He knew what it was like to be in the hands of a higher authority intent on destroying his dignity as well as his life.

I can only imagine the foul words that were screaming through Jesus' mind as he looked down from the cross. He WAS human. But he didn't act on those words. He looked around instead for someone else whose heart was hurting more. A broken criminal who discovered in his broken neighbor a moment of grace, a freedom granted not by Pontius Pilate or the High Priest Caiaphas but by a battered and bruised man who could no longer breathe or move his hands or feet.

Hurt hurts. But love heals. An act of kindness or forgiveness can be as contagious as a cruel insult. It can help soften the heart of another, and just as certain heal our own.
