

MUST WE HATE JUDAS? A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FATHER JOE SCOTT

One of the problems we have with Judas is that the writers of the four gospels—and possibly all their Christian contemporaries--hated him. The betrayer of Jesus became the ultimate symbol of evil. All we know about Judas comes from the four gospels. Did he exchange Jesus' life for thirty pieces of silver? Did he steal from the money the disciples set aside for the poor? Did he commit suicide, in those days viewed (MOST regrettably) as one of the greatest of sins?

We only know what the gospel writers tell us. (I've often wondered which of them was around to witness Judas hanging himself!).

Who was Judas the child of God, a young man who heard the words of Jesus and wanted to follow in his footsteps, one of the twelve apostles whom Jesus considered so trustworthy he put him in charge of the group's money? We have forgotten him.

As the years went by, and Christians were more likely to be Gentile than Jewish, the figure of Judas(the Jew) became an excuse for harassing or killing the Jews of their own time. Good Friday became the opportunity for a bloodbath organized by pious Christians,

Reading these accounts, perhaps especially in the gospel of John, I wonder if the gospel writers were failing to honor one of Jesus' greatest words of challenge: "Love your enemies, pray for those who persecute you." I don't blame them—they were only human. But if they hated Judas, must we?

The only words Jesus voiced on the subject were ironically on the cross: "Father, forgive THEM, for they know not what they are doing." I take "them" to refer to everyone who was part of that sorry day, including the bad thief as well as the good, including Judas.

What if we celebrated "Spy Wednesday", the unforgiving name often given to the Wednesday of Holy Week, as a day of Judas' birthday into heaven, not from his own efforts but from God's grace and Jesus' graceful forgiveness? What would change in us, in our imagination, in our hearts?
