A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

THE ELEVENTH COMMANDMENT: "THOU SHALT NOT BE GRUMPY!" A Reflection by Paulist Father Joe Scott

I'm a grumpy old man. My computer does something to anger me just about every day. Moreover, my computer doesn't care about my feelings. If I hit it in frustration, it will cost me a sore hand, and money for repairs.

So, I pass my anger on to the people with whom I work and live. In doing so, I make their lives less pleasant.

Some people seem to carry with them a grumpiness that lasts forever, even when it's a nice day for everyone else. I can think of at least four reasons why someone carries around a constant state of grumpiness.

One reason is having a truly miserable childhood. It's a tragedy that so many helpless children must endure verbal, physical and sexual abuse. Being constantly yelled at or physically assaulted by one or both angry parents, day after day, robs us of the ability to feel the joy Jesus wants for us. It's hard to suddenly put a smile on our faces, just because we've reached age 21.

A second reason for grumpiness is grief. When we get older, we lose our health, our friends, our spouse, and eventually everyone we love or who has loved us. It's nearly impossible to feel happy when we're lonely.

A third reason for grumpiness is physical pain. If we have arthritis or a bad back, or some other chronic illness, we can feel even more lonely. We like to say, "how are you?", but we don't really expect an answer. Nobody likes a complainer for very long.

A fourth reason for being grumpy is what St. Paul possessed, a naturally bad temper. Paul wasn't happy about this. He called it his "thorn in the flesh." He knew it caused him trouble with his work, and even with his friends. It cost him his friendship with St. Barnabus, who got along well with everyone. Paul gave himself no excuses. But he knew he needed God's help to change.

So how do we deal with a person who's always grumpy? Jesus has good advice here: "do not be afraid." We tend to be afraid of other people's anger, especially when it's directed toward us! So, we try to avoid them. We shouldn't allow ourselves to be intimidated by another person's anger. It's bad for them, and it's bad for us. Let's be braver than that.

It's very important to remember that the man or woman who seems bent on hurting me is bearing far more hurt in their own lives and hearts. Hearts are naturally soft. They're made hard for a reason.

The two greatest Christian virtues are patience and a sense of humor. Grumpy people give us a wonderful opportunity to grow in these virtues. We grumpy people can profit from growing in these virtues as well.

Simple acts of kindness bear fruit, even when the grumpy person doesn't respond the way we want them to. I'm a grumpy person who enjoys receiving completely unearned and unexpected acts of kindness. They soften MY heart, at least for a while.

So, if you're a chronically grumpy person, it's important to realize that grumpiness is doing neither you nor me any good. Jesus says: be compassionate, as your heavenly Father compassionate."

The Beatles – John, Paul, George and Ringo said; "in the end, the love you take is equal to the love you make."

If you're feeling down, find someone who needs you (there are a lot of them in this world) and do something that helps THEM, even in the smallest way possible, and you'll feel better.

Let's us all, you and I, work at carrying a smile on our faces. Life is so short. Don't waste any of it being grumpy!
