Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old

WORKERS FOR THE HARVEST

A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FR. JOE SCOTT

IN TODAY's GOSPEL, Jesus realizes he needs help in spreading the gospel. We know he picked twelve men, but it's interesting the choices he makes. He doesn't pick any Temple priests, an elite class who received their office by birth and heredity. He doesn't choose any rabbis, who received special training in the Jewish Law. Jesus chooses instead laymen who, so far as we can tell, had almost no education. Fishers and tax collectors did not have much learning apart from their craft. Neither does Jesus choose people who might be considered powerful or influential members of their community. He chooses men who have spent enough time with him that they love him and want to treat people the way he treated people.

We need more good pastors and leaders in our Church. Everyone knows this. Why don't we finally think about reaching out to women with the invitation to share their gifts of love and service and leadership within the Catholic church?

We know that practically every other Christian church, except the white Southern Baptists, has done this. Most Protestant Churches now feature women preachers. The Anglican Church, our closest neighbors in theology, are now regularly ordaining women as both priests and bishops.

It used to be unthinkable within the Jewish community that a woman could serve as a rabbi. Now nearly all branches of Judaism select women as rabbis. I've worked with several woman rabbis and have been very impressed by the leadership they now share with their communities and with the larger community that includes us.

Why are we so startingly different in our refusal to hear women preachers? Let's be honest: the primary reason is a fear of women as bearers of temptation that has cursed our Church almost from its beginnings. If you're doubtful about this, ask any Bishop, even a nice one, what he thinks about women as preachers of the Good News in our Catholic Churches?

The odds are pretty good that "Bishop Whoever" will respond with a horrified look, and a refusal to engage with you in any reasonable discussion about the issue. You're not even allowed to THINK about it, and neither is he! That's FEAR! And didn't Jesus say, "don't be afraid?"

What's the point of having a Christian community if we can't be honest with each other? If we can't even THINK about what seems like a perfectly legitimate question, and a perfectly legitimate need?

Some years ago, Paulist Fr. Bob Rivers invited me to participate in a preaching team for Evangelization. Jesus sent his missionaries out in two, and so did Fr. Bob. Each Paulist was teamed with either a Religious Sister or a laywoman. My team member Joan and I shared in leading eight missions over a period of four years. We began preaching as a team at the Sunday Mass and then gave mission talks together for the five nights of the mission. We also gave talks in the schools and led prayer groups. These were middle of the road parishes, each in a different State. I learned a lot from my mission partner, Joan, and I hope she learned a few things from me!

The important thing was that the people in all the parishes we visited accepted Joan's preaching as a work of the Holy Spirit, as did the pastors who had invited us.

Of course, it helped that my partner Joan had preaching talent and pastoral gifts. It was also important that Paulist Fr. Bob Rivers recognized those gifts and listened to the Holy Spirit in giving both of us the opportunity to preach.

I invite you all to pay attention this October when Pope Francis convenes in Rome a world-wide gathering of the Synod of the Catholic Church, in order to respond to the many issues our world faces. This will take place in two sessions, from October 2023 to October 2024. It used to be only Bishops attended synods, but the Pope has invited both lay men and lay women to participate and has given them voting power in the deliberations. Let me emphasize this: women delegates will have the same voting power as everybody else. Make no mistake about it, this is a major step forward in our Church!

Old St. Mary's parishioners participated in the earlier steps of this synod. Now, our task is to pray for the men and women delegates. What if each of us starts praying now that the Holy Spirit will inspire us to give Catholic women the voice in the Church that we so evidently need. There's no harm in praying!
