
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PARISH MISSION STATEMENT

OLD SAINT MARY'S, built in 1854 as California's first Cathedral, was the first Cathedral to be named in honor of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception. The Paulist Fathers were given Pastoral responsibilities of Old St. Mary's in 1894 and have faithfully ministered to the people of Chinatown, Nob Hill and the Financial District ever since. A Survivor of the 1906 earthquake and fire, this major historical landmark has been retrofitted to



meet new seismic codes; however, we must now comply with the American Disability Act and refurbish the interior of this beautiful old cathedral. Notes from the Paulist

SUMMER SABBATH



As a child, summer was my favorite season. School was out, so I could sleep late each morning and spend the days, and most thrillingly the long twilight evenings, playing outdoors. Adult responsibilities are as present in summer as at other times of the year, yet, as I go about my workday, the warmer weather can still evoke memories of shivering delightedly in icy lake water, walking barefoot through freshly mowed grass or watching fireworks bursting high over the trees of our neighborhood park.

One aspect of summer that has persisted through the years is the welcome tradition of vacations. A vacation can be taken in any season, yet somehow it is summer when most of us find the opportunity to slip away from our normal places and routines. Something in the warmth and sunshine seems to beckon rest and renewal.

Some of us spend our vacation pursuing favorite hobby, perhaps fishing or researching our family roots. Others prefer to spend time with a paint brush or gardening trowel “getting the house in order.” For many, vacation becomes an opportunity to travel, to visit the Grand Canyon or our cousins in Pittsburgh.

Vacations may be best when they prove a little scary. We find ourselves in a place we’ve never been, negotiating unfamiliar customs. Everyone speaks a language we don’t understand, and the guidebook of helpful phrases is not as helpful as we’d hoped. Set loose from well-worn routine, we surprise ourselves into discoveries. We see life afresh. To drink from this fountain of life-renewing energy is one of the reasons we seek time away.

Summer may be a good occasion to reflect upon two treasures from our traditions of faith: the sabbath day, and the pilgrimage.

A sabbath is not so much a “day of rest” as it is a “day of freedom.” God gifts us with one day each week intended to be free from work but also liberated from worry, an opportunity to set aside for a solid 24 hours all the problems and anxieties that beset us. The sabbath tells us that rest, leisure, joy and delight are as much a sharing in the grace of God as the activities in which we are otherwise engaged.

A pilgrimage is a way of discovering the sacred in our world through the discipline of traveling. For centuries Christians have visited places considered “holy” like Jerusalem or Lourdes. On a pilgrimage, the journey to and from bears as much value as the destination. One of my friends sets aside a week each summer to hike a portion of the pilgrimage road to the shrine of Santiago de Compostela in Spain. Each year he begins at that point of the road where last year’s walk ended. He has yet to reach the shrine. But he has climbed mountains and enjoyed bread and cheese in tree-shaded villages and discovered many new friends along the way. In this he walks in the subtle footprints of God.

What opportunities for sabbath does your summer hold? How might your vacation become a pilgrimage?


