FRIEND OR FOE? A REFLECTION BY PAULIST FATHER JOE SCOTT

(PART ONE)

Last week I was riding on the BART (Bay Area Railway Transit) train. No one else was on board until one man got on. He looked to me like trouble. I was glad he had seated himself far from me, but still, I became worried. I had my backpack with me, and checked to make sure there was something in it heavy enough to protect me if I needed it. Then I looked down at the tee shirt this fierce looking man was wearing. It held a sign that announced: "I need a hug." I immediately relaxed!

Now, I didn't go over and give him a hug—I'm way too much of an introvert for that! But--I now knew that he had something in common with me—don't we all need a hug, sometimes?

I thought later about the process I went through, as I sat on my seat on the BART (Bay Area Railway Transit) First came the thought—this person looks very different from me. Is he going to hurt me?

Second came a feeling: I'm afraid. I could feel my body doing what it does when I'm afraid. I tensed up and directed my most alert eye on this stranger. If the man had been sitting closer to me, my Third step might have been a word or words: "Get away from me. I think you're dangerous!"

But if he had gotten up and moved toward me, my Fourth step would have been to hit him hard with my well-stocked backpack. Who knows what would have happened after that? This guy did have big muscles!

But what if I hadn't seen and read that tee-shirt saying, "I need a hug?" What would I have done then? If I had whacked this guy over the head with my heavy back-back, how would HE have responded? How would I have felt about it?

It seems that I hear a lot of talk this day about those whom you or I should consider our "enemy?" Is it easier to make an enemy than it is to make a friend? Why do we seem to NEED enemies? Why do we always need to be number one, and never number two? What do YOU think?

Archdiocese of San Francisco, Chapter 11 Update

- •The Archdiocese of San Francisco announced that it has filed for Chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code to manage legal expenses and facilitate settlements with abuse survivors.
- •Our parish is not part of this action. Our daily operations and the celebration of Sacraments and regular parish life will be unaffected by the action taken by the Archdiocese.
- Understandably, this may raise concerns from families, employees, & community members concerned about the impact on the operations and stability of Archdiocesan Elementary and High schools.
- •Like the parishes, the Archdiocesan Catholic schools are not included in the bankruptcy filing.
- The Chapter 11 filing and the related legal proceedings will not have direct impact on the day-to-day operations of our schools.
- •The continued employment, salaries, & benefits of school employees will not be impacted by this filing.
- Tuition, philanthropic support, parish support of schools will, as always, be fully dedicated to funding the operations of the schools and is not impacted by the Chapter 11 filing.
- The Archdiocese will continue to administer health benefits, along with the various retiree programs, without interruption. The funds for these programs are held in trusts and can only be used for their specified recipients.
- •All parish activities and our ministries to help our communities will continue.
- Many parishioners have also heard or seen media stories accusing the Archdiocese of filing Chapter 11 to obfuscate their responsibilities to sexual abuse survivors, but that accusation is simply not true. We believe a Chapter 11 filing is the best way to ensure that all sexual abuse claims filed against the Archdiocese will result in a fair and equitable resolution for the survivors.
- Without the oversight of the Chapter 11 reorganization process, there was nothing preventing the first cases in line for litigation from receiving large recoveries, possibly leaving nothing for survivors with litigation dates in the future.
- The Chapter 11 process will also allow all claims to be resolved at the same time & not over years of protracted litigation per claim.
- While working toward a fair and equitable resolution for all sexual abuse survivors, it remains vital that we continue focusing on all our missions, charitable works, and religious education in the Archdiocese.
- Chapter 11 is a very transparent process, and all activities are available to the public through the court docket free of charge. The Archdiocese assets, and all operations must be presented to the Court, creating an opportunity to provide fair and equitable recoveries for sexual abuse survivors, while allowing all Archdiocese ministries to continue.
